Coverage Report

December 1st to December 31st 2022

We compiled thirty-four publications related to the bilateral relationship between Mexico and the United States during the period, from which 38% were written by Mexican think tanks, while 62% of the publications were published by the United States think tanks. The *Consejo Mexicano de Asuntos Internacionales* (COMEXI)¹ was the leading institution with eleven publications, followed by the Mexico Institute with six publications and The Coppel-Intuit Center for Binational Institutions (CBI) with four publications.

The central theme was the **institutional relationship**, mainly due to the 200th anniversary of bilateral relations between Mexico and the United States. The articles discussed the complexity and challenges of the relationship, which requires constant diplomacy, agreements, and cooperation of both countries in terms of politics, economy, culture, and society, to name a few areas, to face present and future challenges. On the other hand, on December 16, the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Mexico, Marcelo Ebrard, visited Washington D.C., where he met with his U.S. counterpart, Secretary of State Antony Blinken, and the national security advisor, Jake Sullivan. At this meeting, they prepared the visit of President Joe Biden to Mexico, as well as details for the North American Leaders' Summit, which is being held this January in Mexico City. Moreover, the meeting also focused on the bilateral agenda, progress in terms of trade, migration issues at the border, and security, mainly the fight against fentanyl and arms trafficking.

The second most relevant topic was **international trade**, featuring the strengthening of North America as a trading bloc, the economic ties between the three countries, and the importance of clear trade regulations and a transparent and efficient dispute resolution process, which provides certainty to businesses. In the last two years since the USMCA entry into force, foreign direct investment in Mexico has increased steadily, and 2022 was a historic year in the country's trading flows.²

Subsequently, the topic of **democracy** was addressed, where the debate centered on the upcoming U.S. presidential election and the 2024 Republican presidential candidacy of Donald Trump. Followed by immigration, featuring the immigration crisis at the border, in which last fiscal year, immigrant encounters rose to almost 2.4 million at the southern border. And the 2023 fiscal year, which began in October, has already seen more than half a million migrant encounters. ³ In terms of **security and governance**, the debate focused










on the fight against drug and arms trafficking, mainly on the illegal trade of fentanyl. Followed by the **economy**, where the only topic covered was Mexico's outlook for 2023. Furthermore, the Mexican government was mentioned in some articles discussing the country's Supreme Court of Justice. Finally, **energy** and the **environment** were discussed concerning the challenges presented at COP27 for the North American market and the mechanisms to be resolved to comply with the Río Grande water treaty.



Relevant short-term events for the bilateral relationship and percentage of publications for selected topics



The chart above shows the most popular topics covered in each report over time. In this period, international trade and immigration rose in interest compared to the previous month. This is due to the publications regarding North America as a trade bloc in preparation for the Trilateral Summit and the articles focused on the immigration crisis on the United States-Mexico border. The expected topics over time are international trade, institutional relations, economy, security and governance, and migration.
