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
Coverage Report

July 1st to July 31st, 2023

We compiled 18 publications related to the bilateral relationship between Mexico and the United States. From all the publications, 11% were written by Mexican think tanks, while 89% were written by United States think tanks. Mexico Institute was the leading think tank with 4 publications, followed by AS/COA, American Enterprise Institute, Baker Institute, Brookings Institution, and CSIS with 2 publications each. During July, the most mentioned topics were **North America** with 6 publications, **Security and Rule of Law** with 5 publications, and **Democracy and Institutions** with 3 publications.

Topics Covered











North America

During July, publications focused on the three-year anniversary of the USMCA. From a strategic point of view, think tanks assessed the positive outcomes of the USMCA, such as the growth in trade, the increasing interest from CEO's towards reshoring, and the continuous support of the USCMA from the country's population. However, and taking into consideration the Sunset Clause, there are some areas which need to be taken into account. Among them are the disputes' settlements and the governments' compliance with the results, the enhancement of the supply chain resilience, digital trade, data flows, worker training, and the expansion of opportunities for small and medium enterprises (SMEs). Think tanks also refered to the 2024 Mexican elections, and they analyzed the possible outcomes regarding economy, security and politics that could affect the region.

NORTH AMERICA RECENT DATA

- In the U.S., support for USMCA hit 80% in 2021 according to a_Chicago Council on Global Affairs Survey, an improvement since the 45% who supported the NAFTA in 2008. (Mexico Institute)
- In 2022, the total value of trade within North America exceeded \$1.5 trillion, equivalent to nearly \$3 million per minute and the result of double-digit growth in trade over the past two years. (Brookings Institution)

Security and Rule of Law

Regarding Security and Rule of Law; the main topics mentioned in July are the US-Mexico border and the illegal trade of drugs. Due to the recent enactment of the Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2023, there were some budgetary changes that will affect the patrolling of the border between the two countries. However, this is a cause of concern for many due to the increase in drug and human trafficking. The violence in Mexico and lack of rule of law regarding drugs and drug epidemic in the United States are stated as the main source of this bilateral issue.

Democracy and Institutions

During July, publications revolved around the Mexican president Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador and the upcoming 2024 elections. Over the past month, Mexican political parties have begun campaigning for the presidential elections, even though the legal campaigning period has not begun. This is caused by the actions of the Morena party and its four main contenders, which are all closely related to Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador. The president has also made many negative comments around Xochil Galvez, the strongest contender from the opposition. These events have created a hostile environment in which the National Elections Institute has had to change its regulations in order to accommodate these precipitated actions.

- Mexican President, Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador, has a 68% approval rating in June 2023. (AS/COA)
- The polls for the 2024 presidential elections show Claudia Sheinbaum and Marcelo Ebrard as the top two for the Morena party. While Xóchitl Gálvez and Santiago Creel are the top two for the opposition. (AS/COA)

Other topics

Economy and Trade and **Energy and ESG's** were the next most mentioned topics. Both categories mentioned the Mexican government's actions during AMLO's administration from a strategic point of view. Regarding **Economy and Trade**, publications argue that AMLO's decisions have missed out on the opportunities that foreign direct investment could provide to the country given the fact that companies are reducing their reliance on China. Also, think tanks highlighted the importance of the border and how it could boost the economy of both countries if public and private agents cooperated to set up more efficient procedures. As for **Energy and ESG's**, publications assessed Mexico's 2019 energy reform and its effects on the economy. Also, they analyzed the inequalities between states in Mexico due to high energy prices in southern states and the lack of competitiveness this entails.

- CFE has closed out its last two years with financial losses of more than 58 billion pesos, a situation not seen since 1990. (CSIS)










Relevant short-term events for the bilateral relationship

- The topic of **North America** had mainly strategic publications because of the three-year aniversary of the USMCA. Think tanks focused on the previous years' analysis and the forecast for the next three years before the six-year review that the Sunset Clause establishes.
- **Security and Rule of Law** included both short-term and strategic publications. The short-term included analysis on the recent COVID-19 crisis and its possible relationship to crime, while other publication reported about children trafficking. From the strategic point of view, think tanks assessed Mexico's role within the fentanyl crisis and the U.S. patrols' actions at the border and how Biden's actions differ from the previous administration.
- Publications regarding **Democracy and Institutions** included only short-term publications due to the AS/COA tracking of the upcoming Mexican elections.





This month's strategic publications' percentage grew in comparison to previous months, especially because of the analysis of USMCA three years after its creation. Think tanks not only analyzed the results related to economy and trade, but also remarked the importance of governments and private enterprises to achieve the treaty's initial objectives. This type of analysis benefits governments, and the private and public sector as they acknowledge both the achievements and pending issues that will need to be addressed in the short-term.
