Coverage Report

January 1st to January 31st, 2023

We compiled thirty-five publications related to the bilateral relationship between Mexico and the United States during the period from these 20% were written by Mexican think tanks, while 80% of the publications were published by United States think tanks. The Mexico Institute was the leading institution with eleven publications, followed by The Heritage Foundation with five publications.

In the context of the **North American Leaders' Summit** that took place in Mexico City on January 9th and 10th, this month's publications were focused on this meeting and the discussions around it. The tenth trilateral encounter between the presidents of Mexico, the United States, and Canada approached key topics such as migration, security, drug trafficking, supply chains, and labor mobility. Special emphasis was made on economic competitiveness in terms of how to promote the region through the nearshoring of semiconductor supply chains and battery production of electric vehicles. Additionally, the importance of the location of minerals related to these productive activities was highlighted. In relation to drug trafficking and border crime, fentanyl production was the most discussed topic. Overall, the publications remarked on the cordiality during the encounter and the opportunity that a friendly trilateral relationship would represent for the region.

The second most analyzed topic was **migration** due to President Biden's visit to the southern border of the United States. His administration announced changes in migratory policies, the most important being the amplification of the humanitarian parole program. This program now includes citizens of Cuba, Haiti, and Nicaragua, along with the previous incorporation of Venezuelans in October 2022. Nonetheless, Biden's decisions on migration and the asylum system are being questioned, especially concerning Title 42 of the migratory law. This title allows border authorities to expel immigrants to their country of origin or the last country visited before their arrival to the United States. The use of Title 42 increased significantly during the Trump administration due to the pandemic under the catchphrase 'Remain in Mexico'. Consequently, in April 2020, the encounters between immigrants and border patrol agents decreased to historical minimums. Nevertheless, the situation changed rapidly, and in November 2022 these border encounters









reached the maximum in 20 years.¹ Therefore, migration continues to be the protagonist in the trilateral relationship.

On the other hand, the **institutional relationship** was also an important topic in the publications. After the North American Leaders' Summit, think tanks published the results of the encounter and analyzed its key points and next steps to make the agreements plausible. Additionally, because of the trilateral dialogue, there was an emphasis made on **competitiveness**, specifically on the opportunities that the USMCA offers to the region and the actions required in sectors such as logistic infrastructure, rule of law, energetic transition, and human capital.² Moreover, **international trade** was relevant due to the decision made by the Mexican government to implement export tariffs for white corn. This, along with the previous limitations imposed on transgenic corn and the implications of both policies were discussed in various publications. In this same subject, e-commerce, technological relationships, and 5G networks took relevance in the discussions of the think tanks.

Finally, concerning technology, several articles centered their analysis on the Mexican government and the decisions made by the Lopez Obrador administration related to information technologies and communication. They argue that while the 2013 reform to the Telecommunications Act was a positive move in terms of competitiveness by opening to foreign direct investment, the current administration's project "Internet for all" is a setback. Although the program's objective of providing internet to rural areas is positive, there are no improvements in other realms of the national digital strategy. Also, due to government constraints such as the imposed high spectrum fees, the Federal Institute of Telecommunications has almost no capacity for action, even though it is an autonomous institution. Therefore, within this landscape, telecommunications cannot be an area where regional collaboration could be enhanced.












Relevant short-term events for the bilateral relationship and percentage of publications for selected topics



The chart above shows the most popular topics covered in each report over time. In this period, the topic of the Trilateral Summit is of vital importance due to the encounter between the three countries on January 9th and 10th. Immigration continues on the radar especially because of Biden's visit to the border and the migratory policies implemented by the United States. Furthermore, the institutional relationship continues to be a key topic, and it is expected to keep its relevance given the agreements and proposed agendas for 2023 in subjects such as international trade, security, and immigration.
