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
### **Coverage Report**

May 1st to May 31st, 2023

We compiled 23 publications related to the bilateral relationship between Mexico and the United States. From all the publications, 17% were written by Mexican think tanks, while 82% were written by United States think tanks. AS/COA, American Enterprise Institute, Baker Institute and CSIS were the leading institutions with three publications each. During May, the most mentioned topics were **Migration and Labor Mobility** with 13 publications, followed by **Economy and Commerce** with 5 publications and **Democracy and Institutions** with 2 publications.

### **Migration and Labor Mobility**

During May, publications mainly focused on the end of Title 42 on May 11th. Some think tanks describe the trajectory of this measure, while others wonder what will come next. Other regulatory measures which are still valid were discussed, such as Title 8, which allows rapid deportations and prison time for people who attempt to illegally cross the border, as well as Humanitarian Parole, Migrant Protection Protocols such as the "Remain in Mexico" program, Temporary Protected Status and Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals. Also, the Baker Institute released an article with the psychological implications of Title 42, which describes the mental crisis that the migrants go through under this measure.

# MIGRATION AND LABOR MOBILITY RECENT DATA

In 2021, only 18% of the 62.500 available spaces for asylum seekers were filled (Baker Institute).

In 2023, more than 1 million asylum seekers are still waiting for their court hearing (Baker Institute).

2.8 million people were expelled under Title 42 between March 2020 and March 2023 (AS/COA).

### **Economy and Commerce**

Within this topic, publications focused on the disagreements the U.S. is having regarding digital trade, especially because of the free flow of data that the USMCA Chapter on Digital Trade states. Also, the new Tesla factory that is going to be built in Nuevo Leon, Mexico was addressed by explaining the reasons of the investment. These include geographic proximity, labor costs and the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA), and a consumer subsidy for electric vehicles, which can apply to any vehicles sourced in Mexico, the U.S. or Canada. The first North American Semiconductor Conference (NASC) took place on May 18 and 19, as a commitment made during this year's NALS, it aims to boost North America's capacity in the semiconductor industry. Finally, IMCO analyzed fifteen socioeconomic indicators in an effort to evaluate the level of preparation that each state has to take advantage of the opportunities generated by nearshoring.

# ECONOMY AND COMMERCE RECENT DATA

Mexico is now the 6th largest auto producer in the world, with 4 million autos and light trucks produced in 2019, representing \$121 billion dollars worth of cars and components (Baker Institute).

### **Democracy and Institutions**

Publications on this topic focused on the presidency of Andrés Manuel López Obrador, highlighting his approval rate as well as the democratic backsliding experienced in the last five years. Through an analysis, the publications commented on the lessons learned and the consequences of this change in government leading up to the 2024 elections. There was also a monitor published on the Mexican president's approval rating; which remains above 60%. The publications also touch on the authoritarianism and populism being faced in Mexico, especially in context of the attack on the National Electoral Institute, and the challenges that this could entail in the future.

# DEMOCRACY AND INSTITUTIONS RECENT DATA

President Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador maintains an approval rate above 60% both in satisfaction with his government and in the execution of his public policies (AS/COA).

40% of Mexicans would vote for Morena in the 2024 presidential elections (AS/COA).

### Other topics

Apart from the three main categories other topics such as **Energy and ESG** and **Security and Rule of Law** were mentioned. The first one was addressed by a publication which focused on the importance of clean energy for the integration of North America as a region, especially in the context of the possibilities that nearshoring represents. Mexico is the country furthest behind in the energy transition, which in turn creates a need to attract investment and ensure public policies that can facilitate this process (IMCO). Regarding Security and Rule of Law, the Baker Institute released a publication of three recent criminal cases of Mexican officials held in the United States and questions Mexico's rule of law and the impact of the judicial relationship between both countries.

### Energy and ESG Data

With the Inflation Reduction Act the Biden administration has facilitated \$40 billion in loans and \$27 billion in grants for clean energy projects (IMCO).

In Mexico, the Plan Sonora aims to attract \$48 billion in solar photovoltaic and wind farms between 2023 and 2030 (IMCO).










### Relevant short-term events for the bilateral relationship

- The topic of **Migration and Labor Mobility** had mainly short-term publications because of the Biden Administration's decision to end Title 42. Think tanks enquired on the future measures to be established now that mass migrations are expected in the short-term.
- The publications in the **Economy and Commerce** section referred to more strategic topics regarding the possibilities of the semiconductor industry and the digital trade. Nonetheless, there were short-term publications, such as the one regarding the new Tesla factory in Mexico.
- **Democracy and Institutions** publications focused on President Andrés Manual Lopez Obrador and the oncoming 2024 presidential elections.

The next chart shows that 74% of this month's publications were related to short-term events, while 26% of them discussed strategic issues.

Although short-term analyses are fundamental to understanding the bilateral relationship, we encourage think tanks to address these issues in a more strategic and long-term perspective. Topics such as the semiconductor industry, digital trade, clean energy, and the migratory measures require proposals that will have major effects in the bilateral relationship in the long-term and could also assess policy makers in both countries. In this sense, documents such as the Nearshoring analysis by IMCO provide the necessary insights to make policy proposals that are necessary from the strategic prospective.
